Lone Star Ticks on MV Overview

Lone star ticks are a relatively recent arrival on Martha's Vineyard. The first known record is from Long Point Wildlife Refuge in 1985. Even as late as 2012, they were known from only a few locations on the Island. However, by 2014 when we began putting more effort into looking for lone star ticks, we realized they were much more common than we suspected. In the last four years we have found them on more than 70 properties on the Vineyard. This map shows those locations, with higher numbers of ticks represented by larger circles.

Clearly the greatest concentration of lone star ticks is on Chappaquiddick, especially in the cedars on Cape Poge. However, there is a second concentration at the opposite end of the Island in Aquinnah. So far we have not done many surveys in Aquinnah, when we do we will almost certainly find more locations that have lone star ticks.

Although we do not have enough data to make a definitive statement, it appears that lone star ticks are spreading across the Island; we now find them almost everywhere on Chappaquiddick, in most of Chilmark and in some parts of West Tisbury. This map will be updated each year at the end of the tick field season, allowing us to see changes in the locations and numbers of lone star ticks over time.
